Episode Title and Number: There's an End to This Monster Book (Season 2, Episode 6)

Episode Summary: In this episode, co-hosts Sara Dixon and Daniel Pewewardy tackle category 3: A Book That Intimidates You. Joining them is Dr. Francis Connor, an Associate Professor of English at Wichita State University. They talk about Shakespeare, Classics, how people's relationships to reading and books have changed in the past six-hundred years and why we should read more books that intimidate us.

Guest Bio: Dr. Francis X. Connor is an Associate Professor of English at Wichita State University, where he specializes in Shakespeare and Early English Literature. Born and raised in the coal-mining region of Pennsylvania, Dr. Connor studied English Literature and Drama at the University of Scranton, and later at George Mason University in Arlington, VA and The University of Virginia, where he earned his Doctorate. His areas of study included bibliography, book history and textual theory. In 2010 Dr. Connor joined the editing team for the New Oxford Shakespeare at Indiana University-Purdue University Indianapolis and has worked on a couple of publications as part of this team, including *William Shakespeare: Modern Critical Edition* (Designed for classroom use), published in 2016, and *William Shakespeare: Critical Reference Edition*, published in 2017.

After joining the English faculty at Wichita State University in 2012, Dr. Connor's work has appeared in *Philological Quarterly, Sidney Journal, Papers of the Bibliographical Society of America,* and *Shakespeare Survey.* Aside from literary journals, he also published a book in 2014 titled *Literary Folios and Ideas of the Book in Early Modern England,* which investigates how the literary works of Ben Jonson, Samuel Daniel, Shakespeare, John Taylor the Water Poet, and others published in large-format folios contributed to contemporary debates about the nature of the book.

Although Dr. Connor's main research focus is Shakespeare, his current scholarly project is a book he is collaborating with WSU's Darren DeFrain which will uncover some of the Kansas contributions to the American Independent and Alternative music scene.
